A highlight of our stay in the DR was a visit to the Antonio Javier Nivar IT Center in Cambita Garabitos, near San Cristóbal, where we saw 24 students in a basic computer class who had received Fondo Q scholarships totaling only \$300. I am continually

amazed at what a relatively small amount of money can accomplish. Of course, this only happens and can only continue to happen with your support. Please contribute to Fondo Q and help us to help motivated, low-income boys and girls, and women and men help themselves.

you another way that FQ can make a difference, not only with the recipients, but also in the training of new PCVs.

One of the submissions discusses the Brigada Verde National Conference funded by FQ. This conference benefited 26 Dominican youth and at the same time provided an opportunity for Peace Corps Trainees to observe successful Peace Corps Volunteers working closely with their Dominican counterparts. The training staff coordinated with Brigada Verde by taking 16 Peace Corps Trainees to the conference (costs covered by training, not by FQ). The PC Trainees played an active role in the conference by carrying out activities with the youth, but more importantly, they were able to learn by example while participating with the first and second year Peace Corps Volunteers. Trainees indicated that the conference was one of the most beneficial learning experiences in their training. We feel that participation in this workshop was an excellent tool for developing volunteer skills in working with their future project partners.

Supporting Artistic Development

Through the generous support of Fondo Quisqueya, Mayelin Fermin has successfully integrated into a 40-week painting and drawing class in Esperanza in the province of Valverde. Mayelin is a former student and current teaching assistant at El Instituto de Enseñanza de Niños Especiales (IDENE), a school for children with special needs. Mayelin, who is hearing impaired, has expressed a strong interest in art. Through her course of study, she plans to complete 20 paintings which will take her through the process of developing various drawing and painting skills including breaking down objects into basic shapes, design and composition, color mixing, working with mixed media, and a variety of techniques.

By developing her capacity in this area, IDENE anticipates that Mayelin will be able to integrate these skills into the school community and that she might be able to become an art and manual skills instructor. In addition to strengthening her professional skills, Mayelin is also developing her talents and participating in a community activity in a way that is oftentimes not available to individuals with special needs and limited resources. Her instructor, Nelson Ortiz of Artística Hogar, has expressed success in working with students with a variety of abilities and special needs in the past and sees a lot of potential for Mayelin's development.

FQ Benefits 24 Rural Youth in Computer Literacy

The Antonio Javier Nivar IT Center in Cambita Garabitos, near San Cristóbal, started out with a bang. After its official opening on January 7, 2009, over 200 new computer users are attending a basic computer class. The Center is an offshoot business of a coffee producers group in the province of San Cristóbal, NACAS, and was supported by a Peace Corps Partnership grant

and other funding sources. Through NACAS' 33 coffee associations in different rural communities throughout the province, the primary goal of the IT Center is to take advantage of NACAS' existing rural network in order to teach the members of these isolated communities how to use computers and the Internet.

With the help of Fondo Quisqueya, a US\$300 grant provided scholarships to 24 individuals from two rural communities. For many of these students, this is the first time that they have used a computer. The knowledge they are gaining in the computer course can be transferred to meet their school and work responsibilities.

Juan de Jesus de Leon Puello is one of the students that benefited from the grant. Only half way through the course, Juan feels comfortable using a computer and can now write documents in Microsoft Word. "This course will help me to prepare reports for my high school courses," said Leon Puello. "It has helped me develop. Now I am not intimidated by a computer."

In addition to helping the 24 students, the grant is helping NACAS to achieve another important organizational goal: to integrate more youth and technology into the coffee associations and the producer group. Most rural farmers are well over 50 years old, and few young people have the desire pursue agricultural work. Instead, they opt to move to a larger town or city, but usually they have few applicable employment skills. NACAS is hoping that the youth will drive the necessary technological change in order to improve rural farming and institutional management through improved financial and production data management, technical research using the Internet, improved communication within the associations, and eventually the integration of new agricultural technologies into the farming process.

Brigada Verde Regional Conference

"How to Plan and Implement an Environmental Day Camp"

Peace Corps DR Volunteers planned a regional training conference for their Brigada Verde environmental youth groups. Approximately 15 PCVs and 26 Dominican youth participated in the conference. The youth selected to attend had all shown their enthusiasm for the environment; they participate in the Brigada Verde meetings and in other community activities. This conference focused on teaching the youth how to plan and facilitate an environmental day camp. This involved learning all the steps including planning the number of participants and the length of the camps, fundraising, giving "charlas" [i.e., oral presentations], and doing arts and crafts activities. Youth were asked to bring their prior knowledge and experience of day camps and the environment to the conference.

One group coming from a small campo to the North of the capital called Sierra Prieta demonstrated the skills they learned during their day camp last summer. They excel at making dream catchers, stained glass figures, and Brigada Verde bookmarks. These youth were able to pass on their knowledge and skills to other invited youth during the afternoon arts and crafts roundtable session. After this conference, we hope to see a large increase in the number of environmental day camps that are given this summer by Peace Corps Volunteers and their Brigada Verde youth.

Community Accounting Course

IN MEMORIAM: JAVIER GARZA, PCDR DIRECTOR '03-'05

One thing the Peace Corps did right in 2003 was to actually allow for some overlap between the outgoing and incoming Country Directors in the Dominican Republic. The purpose was to allow for information sharing and to ensure a smooth transition. That was when I met Javier Garza. He was coming in as I was leaving my three-year post as Director of PCDR.



When I first heard that this newly appointed Director hailed from Texas, I immediately thought he must be a wealthy Texan oilman, being sent by the Bush administration. He and I often joked about that later as I came to know this truly down-to-earth, good-humored public servant, Javier Garza. And while Javier took the Peace Corps business very seriously, he also enjoyed a good party and telling jokes. Javier was appreciated by all of his colleagues in the Inter-America and Pacific Region as well as in headquarters and left many friends behind in the DR as well.

Javier Lindel Garza passed away on March 16, 2009 in Saltillo, Mexico, at the age of 60, killed tragically in a bus accident while he was on vacation. Javier spent a lifetime in public service, never forgetting his roots and always keen on helping to make this a better world. He spent his early career in Texas working with the Model Cities program in Edinburg. He went on to lead the Meals on Wheels and More of Austin, Texas program where he was instrumental in its phenomenal growth and success. He served as the PC Country Director in Bolivia until May 2008, following his posting in the DR. When he returned to the US, he settled in Pharr, Texas where he devoted himself to caring for his parents. He is survived by his daughter, Victoria Elise; his father, Jose; his mother, Aurora; two sisters, Melissa and Denise and by his brother, Rolando.

Javier will be truly missed by all of the Peace Corps DR community. We honor his spirit by continuing our work of service.

BOARD MEETING AND TRIP TO THE DR

February is a lovely time to visit the Dominican Republic, and it was time for a Fondo Q Board meeting. The following Board members were able to put the two together: President Lou Ferrand, Rik Laird, Tom Gittins, Bob Tafelski, BJ Warren, and Dave and Kathy Padilla. Board member Jennifer McGowan, living in Santo Domingo, had a much shorter commute! She and her husband, Michael Terrero, provided a lovely sancocho dinner and reception for the board members and their families as well as many of the Peace Corps staff who are involved with Fondo Q's grant and scholarship program. We thank you Jennifer, not only for the lovely evening, but also for being such a capable head of Fondo Q's Local DR Committee, which makes the decisions about funding for scholarships.

The Board had a good meeting with Peace Corps DR Director Romeo Massey and his staff. Conrado Saladin was introduced as the new Peace Corps liaison with Fondo Q. Currently, there are 169 PCVs in country, many of whom are working on HIV/AIDS prevention. We discussed Fondo Q's special environmental grants and ways to encourage more scholarship and grant applica-



tions in the environmental area. We also talked with several PCVs who have sponsored Fondo Q scholarship recipients.

Following the meeting, we traveled to the site of PCV David Mayo, who sponsored a Fondo Q scholarship that provided funding for teachers to give computer courses in the coffee-growing hills outside of San Cristóbal. (See more in another article about the benefits provided to many people from this one "beca").

On Saturday, we took a day off to make sure the beaches were still intact. They really are! On Sunday, we discussed our meetings with Director Massey and his staff and with our Local Committee, and we approved a proposal to fund a two-day Brigada Verde Regional Conference for

Environmental Day Camps. Brigada Verde is a Dominican youth group that many PCVs in the environmental area work with that trains youth to be environmental education facilitators.

The Board approved a continuation of the current goal of awarding at least US\$12,000 in grants and scholarships each year, with most of the grantees receiving no more than US\$300. The Board also decided that providing signed certificates to scholarship recipients upon completion of their courses might help in their job search, as these types of certificates are frequently attached with resumes. Thanks also go to Rik Laird and Patti Rambasek for their hospitality!

FONDO Q'S GRANTS & SELECTION PROCESS

The Fondo Quisqueya Foundation, Inc. ("FQ") is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization which was formed in 1987 by former U.S. Peace Corps Volunteers and Staff who had served in the Dominican Republic ("DR") and who wanted to give something back to the DR. FQ was incorporated in Virginia in 1993.

FQ provides low-income Dominicans with scholarships and grants for both traditional and nontraditional in-country education and training to assist them in bettering their lives and to help them attain personal development,

skills, and advancement.

FQ's grants and scholarships are made possible through donations from ex-PCVs and Staff and other friends of the DR through donations and in-kind support. FQ has no paid staff. Examples of courses funded include English and computer classes, driver training, electronics repair, diesel mechanics, and beekeeping. Funds can be used for tuition, transportation, books and materials, and other expenses associated with the course.

Each applicant must be sponsored by a member of the Dominican community or by a Peace Corps DR Volunteer or Staff Member.

Individual grants and scholarships usually do not exceed US\$300. FQ's Local DR Committee reviews grant applications quarterly and makes recommendations to FQ's Board of Directors for selection. Funds permitting, the Board seeks to fund at least a total of US\$3,000 in scholarships each quarter, for a yearly total of at least US\$12,000.

A CREATIVE WAY TO SUPPORT FQ-GIFTS OF LIFE INSURANCE

Do you own life insurance policies that have cash value but are no longer needed for their original purposes? These can make convenient tax-deductible charitable gifts and provide an excellent way to make a gift in honor or memory of a loved one. Simply contact the carrier of your policy and state that you need a policy change form for change of ownership and beneficiary designation. Forms among carriers vary in name, so just be sure to state that you want to name a charity as both the owner and beneficiary of the policy. Giving paid-up life insurance entitles those who itemize to an income tax charitable deduction equal to the cash value of the policy, or the actual cost basis (premium payments made), whichever is less.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Expenses slightly outpaced revenues for 2008, by about \$450. We gave out nearly \$14,000 in scholarships/grants for 53 individual and four small group awards and spent about \$6,700 on newsletter-related expenses for the two FQ Newsletters which went out in 2008 (layout, printing, and mailing for about 2,000 on our mailing list). We had 93 cash donors and two who paid one of more FQ operating expenses out-of-pocket. The amounts donated varied from as small as \$10 to as much as \$2,000. The average donation was just above \$200, and the most frequent donation amount was \$100.

In 2009, our revenues to date are just over \$4,000 and we have given out slightly above \$5,000 in grants and scholarships, including a special grant of \$2,621 for a Brigada Verde Regional Environmental Conference sponsored by Peace Corps Volunteers. The money for the Conference came from a conservation/environment donation made in a previous year. In addition, at its March 28, 2009 meeting, the FQ Board authorized funding scholarships and grants for the next round of grantees in the amount of \$3,032.

We are about to enter the first of two "donor drought" periods in the year. The first generally occurs shortly after the New Year. Then, typi-

cally, we will see a notable increase following our summer Annual Meeting, followed by another drought until the end-of-the-year giving starts. These droughts, of course, will be impacted by the lousy economic conditions affecting most households at the moment.

Since FQ provides grants/scholarships four times a year, and needs about \$2,500 twice a year to pay for newsletter-related costs, cash flow is important to us. Please consider two suggestions for your FQ giving this year. First, you might want to break up your annual giving to FQ into 2-3 checks. This will help FQ's cash flow and might allow you to give more by the year's end. Second, if you have never given to FQ, please consider doing so, even at a small amount. The fact is, several "heavy hitters" boost our average annual donation to the \$200 mark. Without the nine highest donors, the average is cut almost in half. But there is a lot of potential out there for increasing our revenues. Only five percent of those who receive our newsletter make donations. If the other 95 percent gave only \$10 a year, we would have approximately \$19,000 in additional funds for our mission. Imagine that! So, don't think that what you can give this year is too small. If we all work together, it can make a big difference.

In Memoriam: Lowell Robert "Bob" Satin

Lowell Robert "Bob" Satin, 77, of Anchorage, died April 26 at Providence Alaska Medical Center after a brief illness.
